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Livestock Health Regulations

1. ALL HORSES MUST HAVE CURRENT NEGITIVE COGGIN TEST PAPERS

2. National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP) Poultry Testing Requirement All poultry regardless of age going to shows and/or public exhibit, excluding doves and pigeons must have a safe leg or wing band, and: Come from an NPIP certified Salmonella pullorum- Salmonella typhoid clean flock. OR - Have had a negative Salmonella pullorum-Salmonella typhoid test within 90 days prior to going to a show/exhibition. Exhibitors must provide either a signed Poultry Exhibition Statement of Origin form or a VS 9-2 form and have the bird's leg or wing banded prior to the time of entry on Thursday. Birds that have not been banded nor have the proper paperwork will not be allowed to stay on the fairgrounds or be shown at the fair. Go to the ND Department of Agriculture site for a list of Questions & Answers on this testing requirement. If you have further questions, feel free to contact the Extension office.

3. Sheep & Goats Scrapie identification tags are required in all sheep and goats that are exhibited at any of the fairs in North Dakota including the Sargent County Fair. All sheep and goats must be tagged prior to arriving at the fair. To obtain your scrapies identification tags you can call the Federal Veterinary's office in North Dakota at 1-866-873-2824 or contact your local veterinarian.

4. The following health regulations must be adhered to by those bringing livestock: Any animal with evidence of contagious, infectious disease will be dismissed from the fairgrounds immediately. This includes animals showing signs of localized disorders such as club lamb fungus, ringworm, or other dermatophytosis, and warts, as well as systemic diseases of the respiratory or gastrointestinal system such as pneumonia or diarrhea.

5. Any animal with an obvious physical defect or deformity, including, but not limited to prolapses, open sores, eye lesions, lameness, or other physical injury, shall be removed from the fairgrounds immediately.

6. Animals who are recovering from localized skin disorders will be permitted if: there are no open sores; hair is beginning to grow back (as determined by the inspecting veterinarian if one is requested.).

7. Animals that show malnutrition will be excused from the grounds upon arrival.

8. A veterinarian inspection may be requested by the livestock superintendent and the acting Fair Board President if an animal possess health questions. Any fee associated with veterinarian care will be at the cost of the animal owner. The Sargent County Fair Board will not be responsible for pre- or post-expenses associated with exhibiting animals at the Sargent County Fair.

9. **All barns close at 9:00 pm.** No one will be allowed inside the barns after this time. Please be mindful of this and have all of your chores completed before this.

Equine Policy (Open Class)

The following rules will be in effect showing during the Sargent County Fair.

Age Division before September 1 of the previous year:

Junior- ages 6-11; Intermediate- ages 12-14; Senior- 15-18; Adult 19 and over

All registration is from 7:00am- 8:00am Thursday July 23, 2026. A horse can be shown once per event. Exhibitors may have one entry per event. An exhibitor may ride more than one horse in different events during the show, but may not show in the same event more than once. A family-owned or joint ownership horse may be managed jointly by members. Once a horse has been exhibited, it cannot again be exhibited in the same event during the show.

Dress Code-

Exhibitors, 18 and under, must wear an ASTM-SEI approved harness helmet for all mounted events (Western hats are permitted for showmanship)

For Western Events:

Western boots, blue or black colored jeans (dark colored), and a belt.

For English Events:

Conservative- colored coat, breeches or jodhpurs and boots appropriate for hunter classes. Colored shirts are permissible. Conservative-colored ASTM helmets are allowed. Gloves are permitted in English events.

*Non-blinged chaps are allowed in all classes except showmanship

Exhibitor numbers must be clearly visible on both sides of the horse. Exhibitor numbers will be provided by the Sargent County Fair upon registration. 4-H'ers will have their numbers displayed on their back.

Awards-

Awards of Grand, Reserve, Blue, Red, and White will be made for each lot. Ribbon premiums will be dispersed on Sunday at 3pm at the fair office, or will be mailed to the address on the registration paperwork.

General Rules-

- The general rules are set forth by the "ND 4-H Horse Show & Judging Guide" available at the extension office.
- Horses are to be ridden in designated areas only at the fairgrounds. 4-H horses are to be stalled on the fairgrounds the entire length of the fair weekend.
- Helmets are to be worn anytime the horse is mounted.
- Should any horse become unruly, either in the arena or on the premises, the horse and exhibitor shall be dismissed from the ring or premises. No stallion over 8 months of age shall be shown.
- All halter classes will be judged as Showmanship at Halter, (4-H Western Horsemanship) with no limit on the age of the horse shown.
- If a horsemanship project should present a danger to other exhibitors or spectators during the show, a leader, parent or other adult may lend assistance to prevent injury to other people.
- If an adult is present, and nothing is going on in the arena, horses may be warmed up and exercised prior to and after the show.

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

The Sargent County Fair Board reserves the right for final interpretation of all rules and regulations and arbitrarily settles all matters, questions and differences arising in connection with the fair. Please contact a Sargent County Fair Board member with any questions.

1. Registration times as per the fair schedule.
2. Exhibitors are required to remove all exhibits at the designated time. Exhibits not removed or arrangements made for their removal will become the property of the fair after 6:00 pm on Sunday the weekend of the Fair.
3. Entries accepted from any individual wanting to participate.
4. Only listed classes accepted except when special permission from the Fair Board is granted.
5. Members of 4-H exhibiting statics at the fair will be issued gate passes, good for 4-H Static exhibit day only (Friday).
6. Livestock exhibitors will be issued gate passes good for all the fair days.
7. Superintendents of each department shall have full charge of their respective departments.
8. Limit of one entry per individual per lot in open class.
9. Premiums will be mailed after the close of the Sargent County Fair.
10. **All barns close at 9:00 pm.** No one will be allowed inside the barns after this time. Please be mindful of this and have all of your chores completed before this.

Tips on Exhibiting

1. Select uniform specimens slightly over average size when possible. Overgrown specimen is seldom typical and are frequently coarse and lacking in flavor.
2. Select a few extra specimens above the requirements of the premium list for last minute replacements.
3. Showmanship is important. All items in each entry should be uniform in size, shape, color, and degree of maturity.
4. Avoid blemishes cause by decay, dirt, disease, insects or mechanical injury. If blemishes of any kind are severe enough, the exhibit may be disqualified.
5. Vegetables should be washed only as a last resort. Clean vegetables with a soft brush or facial tissue to remove loose soil.
6. Keep the vegetables as fresh as possible before exhibiting.
7. For more information on preparing and exhibiting vegetables and fruit for county fairs, contact the county extension office for the "Harvesting and Preparing Vegetables for Exhibit" publication.

USDA Guidelines must be followed when exhibiting home canned foods at the Sargent County Fair.

Jams & Jellies: must be hot water bathed. No paraffin seals- any jar entered with a paraffin seal will be automatically disqualified. All rings must remain on the jars.

Vegetables: all fresh vegetables except for most tomatoes are low-acid foods and **MUST** be processed in a pressure canner to be free of Botulism risk.

Tomatoes: to ensure safe acidity in whole, crushed or juiced tomatoes, add 2 tablespoons of bottled lemon juice or ½ tablespoon of citric acid per quart of tomatoes. Tomatoes can then be hot water bathed.

Fruits, Pickles, and Sauerkraut: these foods are naturally high in acid so boiling water bath canning is used for them.

Salsa: by following research-tested recipes, salsa can safely be processed in a hot water bath. Other recipes need to be pressure canned.

Meat: must be pressure canned.

Additional rules:

- Jars must be tempered glass canning jars (Kerr, Ball, Mason)
- Jars can be quart, pint, or half-pint

For current guidelines and processing times, contact the Extension office at 701-724-3355 or stop in the office for food preservation publications. **USDA does not approve of the inversion method of sealing canned goods; therefore, all exhibits must be processed. Tomato products must be made using research-based recipes only (recipes from USDA, NDSU Extension, Ball, Kerr, or Sure-Jell)**

All jars must have a printed label attached stating:

1. Type of processing (pressure cooker or water bath)
2. The time it was processed
3. The date the product was canned
